6th Division Spring Meet Proposals - Peter Ulvestad, 6th Div Assistant Supt.

After missing 2 years, the 6th Division Spring Meets are returning starting with Camrose in May. This will be followed by the 2023 Meet being held in Regina.

The 6th Div Meet policy states that meets will take place on the Victoria Day Long Weekend. This is to provide consistency and give an extra day for those working normal schedules. A host group may propose to move the Spring Meet to another weekend, preferably in the month of May.

Normally the prospective Host Group(s) should present their proposal(s) to host a Spring Meet at the Annual Meeting of the 6th Division two years in advance of the proposed Spring Meet. This means we are looking for proposals for 2024 (and even 2025) to be brought forward at the 2022 AGM. The Host Group can be a club or just a group of 6th Div members. Every 7th year, it is our Division's turn to host the PNR Regional Convention. During these years there will not be a 6th Div Spring Meet. The last Regional that the 6th Division hosted was in 2019. Due to COVID adding two years, our next turn is 2028. Host group proposals must be submitted to the PNR three years in advance. 2028 may seem a long way away but that goes by quickly so it's time to start discussions within your groups to have a proposal ready for 2025.

If you have questions about hosting a Divisional Meet or Regional Convention, feel free to contact Ed Molenkamp or myself. We look forward to hearing some proposals at the upcoming Annual Meeting.

6th Division 2022 Annual Meeting - Peter Ulvestad, 6th Div Assistant Supt.

The 6th Division Board recently decided to hold the Annual Meeting virtually again this year. We will be having the meeting via Zoom on the afternoon of Sunday June 12. An email with Zoom details will be sent out via Constant Contact beforehand.

As part of this meeting I would like to propose some changes to the bylaws.

ARTICLE 2: MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

- 2. Conditions of membership
 - A. All members shall receive the publication of the Division "HIGHBALL!". The Division publication "HIGHBALL!" will be made available electronically to all members.

ARTICLE 4: CONVENTIONS AND MEETINGS

1. An annual convention of the Division will be held not in conflict with dates set by the NMRA or PNR for their conventions.

- A. The board will award sponsorship of conventions at least two years prior to the event based on recommendations of the Convention Coordinator. Spring Meets shall be awarded to Host Groups by a vote of the membership at an Annual Meeting of the 6th Division. If a Spring Meet has not been awarded at the Annual Meeting immediately preceding the Spring Meet in question, the Convention Coordinator may award the Spring Meet upon consultation with the Superintendent.
- B. The board may suspend or reschedule the annual convention at the recommendation of the convention coordinator and the Superintendent.
- C. Convention profits are to be divided equally between the Division and the Host. In the event that the Spring Meet makes a profit of less than, or equal to, \$1000, the profits shall be split 50/50 between the Host Committee and the Sixth Division. In the event that the Spring Meet makes a profit of greater than \$1000, the Sixth Division shall receive \$500 and the Host Committee the remainder.
- D. The Division shall provide an interest free loan to the Host committee of a maximum of \$500.00 upon request to act as seed money. This loan shall be repaid in full by the Host as soon as possible after the convention. The Division will not be responsible for any losses incurred by the Host. In the event that the Spring Meet suffers a loss, the Host Committee shall not be required to repay that portion of the start up loan equal to the loss. Any loss in excess of \$500 is the responsibility of the Host Committee.
- E. The board shall have access to the books and records of the Host committee if requested.
- F. The Host committee shall report to the convention coordinator prior to the event on a timely basis to insure that any problems are being dealt with and that items are in order.
- 2. Meetings
 - A. The annual meeting of the Division shall be held at the annual convention or virtually as determined by the Board.

The convention changes need to be made to reflect the Meet Policy that was adopted at the May 21, 2000 annual meeting in Lethbridge. The bylaws were never changed to reflect this new Meet Policy.

Area Reports

Regina – Echo Valley Railroad Guild – Doug Johnson

The members of the Guild have continued to be busy during our extended winter and delayed spring, working on their home layouts. In the meantime, development of their modular layouts has been deferred, to the point where they haven't been operated for two years or more. Club members will be meeting on May 7 and 8 to assemble the layouts and see what works and what doesn't. Railfest 2022, our large public show in Regina, will not be held this year and has been rescheduled to become Railfest 2023, to be held on April 29 and 30, 2023. Guild members have begun planning for the 2023 6th Division meet, called Queen City Express. Committee chairs have been appointed and the members are excited about hosting the event, the first Division meet in Regina since 2012. Because of the proposed timing of the 2023 PNR regional meet in Tacoma which conflicts with the traditional May long weekend timing of the 6th Division meet, alternate dates are being considered. Edmonton Model Railroad Association members have finished (at least for now) what they are able to do on their building expansion. Members installed the drywall and then professionals were brought in to do the taping, sanding, priming and painting. Interior doors are currently being installed and the electricians and plumbers will be back soon to complete their jobs. Fort Edmonton Park will be providing flooring and installation along with doing some outside work. After an over 2 and a half year absence, the EMRA is resuming their quarterly Saturday Open Operating Sessions (OOpS).

News Items from Dale – Dale Sproule

The Locomotive and Railway Historical Society of Western Canada is seeking homes for 3 Fairbanks Morse locomotives that will become homeless later this year. The Canadian Pacific FM H16-44 #8554 and 2 FM CPB16-4 B units 4455-4456 are in storage at a Calgary area gas plant that is being dismantled this year. While only a handful of H16-44s exist, the two CPB16-4s are the last two surviving examples of approximately 50 built for service across North America. If a home is not found for these rare

locomotives they will be scrapped. Interested parties need to call Jim Lanigan, Society President at 1-403-265-9227.

I see Athearn announced the release of their Northern Alberta GP9 units in March of this year. Units #201, #203, #204 will be released May 2023. Price will be \$320 USD for DCC and Sound, \$220 for DC units. These ran around the NAR system from 1964-1975. In January 2021, Athearn had announced the release of cabooses # 13008, # 13011, #13023 for release in July (I assume in reading their press release they mean 2022 – this year??). Pricing on all cabooses are \$35.00 USD. Go to (Athearn Trains.com) for information.

Queen City Express 2023 - Regina – Doug Johnson



This is Ian McIntosh's HO scale Canadian Pacific layout.





Walthers Kit Building – Dave Audley

This past Christmas, I received the Walthers "OFFICE & GUARD SHACK" kit as a Christmas gift from my younger daughter, Tracey. Looking at the photo on the box cover, I knew this would fill the empty area across the tracks from Banff Station. I have been looking for an appropriate structure and this looked pretty good!

I decided as a first step was to get the layout area where this structure was to go ready. I dug out Woodland Scenics #B71 – Fine Dark Brown Ballast – and laid down a covering of that area. I glued in the ballast in place and left that to dry. Grass and





I opened the box and laid out the kit components. At this point, I discovered that there weren't any kit instructions! That's OK as this is a pretty straight forward assembly.



In looking at the box cover photo, I realized that I needed to move the end wall with the door to the other end of the building to fit my scenic arrangement. With that taken care of, I assembled the 4 walls. The plastic walls in this kit are pretty thin. I added bracing to

the upper edges of each wall staying about 1/8" below the top edge. I also added square styrene pieces in each corner,

ensuring the building will stay square. Now I wanted to add the base to the bottom of the building so as to further stiffen the structure. Except that the door had been moved necessitating cutting the base apart to put the door steps into their proper locations. I also cut the rounded ends off the Guard Shack base, making it a square base.





Walthers makes these easily recognizable kits by the hundreds. And I wasn't keen on their colour combinations. Out came the air brush (you can also use paint in rattle cans) and I painted both the office building and guard shack an Olive Green colour. I painted the two door steps a concrete colour (Apple Barrel – 20778 Country Tan). I painted the windows and doors silver. I also added an electrical box and gas meter on the end wall that has the door. These are from a Walthers #933-4075 kit. This kit has been very useful in adding exterior details to buildings. This kit has fairly large windows and would be a candidate for interior detailing. I didn't want to go that far so I used City Classics #195-710 Window Blinds and #195-711 Venation Blinds to "fill" the widows. These are currently out of stock at Walthers but City Classics may have these. The blinds were added after the window glass was glued in place. I also

added working lights over each door. These are Campbell lamp shades glued to Nngineering #N2032U-4 .032 OS stainless tubing. I carefully bent the tubing in a curved 90 degree shape before adding the light shades. I painted these assemblies a gloss green, painting the inside of the light shades gloss white. I then installed an Evens Designs Pico LED in each assembly. Holes were drilled above each door and the light fixtures were glued in place after the wire was threaded through. I wired the LED wire ends together (green to green and red to red) adding a 3.3K resister to the red wire. This protects the LED's from burn-out! I the added an approximate 2 foot length of #22 gauge wire that goes through the layout to a 12 volt DC source.



Turning my attention to the roof, I painted the roof with a coat of Polly Scale Engine Black. This is now out of production but can you use any flat black. Then, after the paint had dried, I used Bragdon's Rust and Dirt powders to finish the roof and glued it in place. Now for a chimney. I had the brick chimney sitting on the work bench. It had the right angle on the bottom so that the chimney sat vertical. You might want to choose a different type of chimney as this structure might be considered too new for a brick chimney!

I finished the guard shack using the above techniques. I added a black trash barrel as well. The gate mechanism can be made to operate if you are careful in gluing the parts together. I added a "STOP" sign decal. I also added red & white

stripping from the Microscale Conspicuity Striping decal set. The box was painted silver and a plastic leg was glued to the inside of the box allowing this detail to be planted in the scene.





I had some years ago, decided to try building a lamp post with various sizes of brass tubing and a Campbell's light shade. This became a one-of as it was too finicky to reproduce. I decided to add this to the guard shack after adding an LED and painting. You can use a commercial product here, if so desired.



This photo shows the main structure in place and the next photo shows the scene with the lights on. I added some cable reels and stacks of sewer pipe. As I look at the photos, I realize I need a lot more details in this scene! That will come in due time.

The white truck is a Classic Miniatures painted white with AGT decals and stripping. The decals are Black Cat. This decal set covers AGT vehicles from the first trucks up to about 1985 or so.



Alyth Diesel Engine Testing Building – Jon Greggs



The prototype building is familiar to anyone who has driven around to the east side of CP's Alyth Yard in Calgary.



Jon Greggs of Calgary scratchbuilt a model of it in styrene, estimating dimensions from photos.

The latest kit produced by Inter-Action Hobbies was inspired by this facility located in Cogar, Oklahoma. As well as the APCO logo, Inter-Action is marketing this kit with some alternative gas company insignia including Cities Service, ESSO, and Sinclair.

Geoff Southwood of Calgary built his model for Cities Service to fit in with his New England layout. Geoff's model was actually a Beta-build for Inter-Action. Before the kit was released for general sale, he built the

kit, making sure the instructions were complete, everything fit as designed, and no pieces were missing. Any discrepancies were noted and corrected by the manufacturer to ensure buyers will be happy.

A lot of details are included, including LED lights. Geoff recommends that you order it with the interior add-on kit. The 3D printed coke bottles are amazing, as are the Coke and Ice machines.
